Farm Bill Programs

- Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)
- Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)
- Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP)

NRCS Wisconsin Agreements

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Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act)

Provides \$918 million (nationwide) for NRCS Watershed Programs that address new, ongoing, emergent, and relief to all communities to address watershed resource concerns.

\$300M Emergency Watershed Protection Program

(in addition to disaster-specific appropriations)

\$118м Watershed Rehabilitation Program

(in addition to \$10M annually through normal appropriations)

\$500M Watershed and Flood Prevention Operations Program (in addition to \$175M annually through normal appropriations since 2017)

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

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Watershed Program

Objectives:

- 1. Prevent damage from erosion, floodwater, and sediment
- 2. Further conservation, development, utilization & disposal of water
- 3. Improve proper utilization of land

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Authorized Purposes by Statute:

- 1. Flood Prevention or Flood Damage Reduction
- 2. Watershed Protection
- 3. Public Recreation
- 4. Public Fish and Wildlife
- 5. Agricultural Water Management
- 6. Water Quality Management

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Project ideas need to align with one or more authorized purposes:

<u>Need</u>

Dams, dikes, flood bypass channels, house relocations, and flood-proofing

Land treatment systems (NHCP practices)

Groundwater recharge basins, rural water lines, irrigation canal lining or canal-to-pipeline conversions, rehab & improvement of drainage district infrastructure

Authorized Purpose

Flood Prevention

- Watershed Protection
 - Ag Water Management

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Project ideas need to align with one or more authorized purposes:

<u>Need</u>

Improve recreational potential of water resource areas: Public Recreation Picnic areas/shelters, sanitary facilities, fishing piers, parking areas, swimming beaches, potable water, trails/walkways/access roads Fisheries and wildlife development projects: Public Fish & Wildlife Water level control structures, fish ladders, fish passage, breeding & nesting features, stream/river/wetland restoration Water Quality Water quality improvement projects: latural Stormwater runoff treatment/retention systems resources Conservation Service



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Authorized Purpose





All conservation practices and measures that can be done under EQIP, RCPP, WRE, CSP should be done under these programs.

Farm Bill practices fall under a programmatic EA which substantially simplifies the time and effort to plan and implement a project.

Watershed projects exceed jurisdiction/capacity of individual landowners.

Collaboration is necessary with local gov't, and Federal/state cooperating agencies, and Tribes.

Watershed projects require a Watershed Project Plan– EA/EIS

Watershed project plans typically run \$500K - \$2M

> Projects must demonstrate an economic benefit to the general public.

Projects must be proven economically, environmentally, and socially defensible and technically sound. Benefit / Cost Ratio > 1

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Statutory Requirements:

- Project must have a Sponsor that meets basic eligibility requirements: Subdivision of state government, power of eminent domain, taxation authority Ability to be a fiduciary and administer engineering/construction contracts
- 2. NRCS funding share < \$25 M
- 3. Agriculture (including rural communities) > 20% of the total benefits
- 4. Watershed area < 250,000 acres (390 sq.mi.)
- 5. Single structure storage capacity < 12,500 acre-feet
- 6. Total project storage capacity < 25,000 acre-feet

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Sponsor requirements:

- Acquisition of real property rights to construct the project and retain control of the property for the evaluated life (50 or 100 years).
- Acquisition of permits and licenses to construct, operate, and maintain
- Administration of construction contracts
- Commitment for cost share funds
- Commitment to fund O&M through the evaluated life may include tax levees, inspection costs, repairs, legal defensibility, tax implications, and emergency action plans.

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Acquisition of real property rights includes:

- Purchase of land or easements to construct projects.
- Changes of existing telephone, power, gas, water, and sewer/sanitary lines or other utilities.
- Construction of new roads and changes of existing public/private roads, or railroad bridges, culverts, and other crossings, including approaches.
- Administrative services to change or acquire those rights, and mitigate for fish and wildlife habitat losses.


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


EQIP Forestry Practice Use By Farm Bill






EQIP Forestry Acres Treated By Farm Bill

NRCS will invest up to \$225 million (nationwide) in RCPP Classic and RCPP Alternative Funding Arrangement projects for 2022.


