In 2019, handbook was rescinded and was instead put out as guidance. Ad hoc teams develop chapters for handbook, and the SGT reviews prior to public input. SGT also reviews other silviculture-related guidance and helps to set 2-year work plans for silviculturists/ecologists and ad hoc teams. Silviculture handbook chapters and ad-hoc membership are subject-specific. Surveyed foresters on handbook—received both positive and negative comments GovDelivery message coming in April 2022: announce rescinded handbook and reformatted guidance in its place. Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) is completed, Fish & Wildlife Service is taking final look at document, with one last public comment period (some time within next month or two) Have been able to actively recruit for a variety of vacant positions.
